SUPPLY LIST FOR DRAWING WITH CHARCOAL (or use what you have):

- 11x17" newsprint pad (or the size you are comfortable with)
- 11x17" pad of 80# heavyweight sketch or charcoal paper (or the size you are comfortable with)
- Compressed charcoal-soft (get a few sticks)
- Vine Charcoal-soft (comes in a pack)
- Charcoal pencil (1 should do-be careful not to drop it, the charcoal is delicate)
- Art gum eraser (the beige ones)
- Fine Point pencil-style eraser (office supply stores or bookstore)
- Pump hairspray, unscented (used as a fixative)-DOLLAR STORE
- A little piece of sandpaper or a sandpaper pad for sharpening charcoal
- A small cloth or rag (paper towel works), blending stumps, (optional)

If you are interested in drawing white on black or toned paper, I will demonstrate it in the 4th and 5th session. You may wish to have:

- A few sheets of good black paper and good neutral colored paper
- A white charcoal pencil
- A white Conte crayon (or white pastel)

To set up for successful drawing at home, I recommend the following: Choose a subject that is light or simple in color, without pattern. Start with simple things-you will find them harder than you expected: a group of white eggs, a clear glass ½ full of water. A white deli paper bag with a fork inside and a strong light shining on the bag, single and small groups of simple objects.

Have a light colored flat surface to place your subject on. Hang or drape something dark behind the subject. Shine a bright light onto the subject to create shadows. A desk lamp works great for this.
